HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

The MSAP Board of Directors met in Lansing on October 12, 2013. The following are highlights from the meeting.

Membership and Extension Committee Chair Suzanne Pederson prepared an MSAP Membership Manual for all MSAP members. Chairman Pederson will send an email notification to members regarding availability of the manual via the website at www.michiganparliamentarian.org and will mail the manual to members who do not use email.

The MSAP Annual Meeting will be held April 12, 2014 with the Board of Directors meeting the night before. The 2014 Annual Meeting host is the Michigan Unit of Registered Parliamentarians (MURP) who have made arrangements for the meeting to be held at Central Michigan University Bovee Center in Mt. Pleasant.

The 10th Annual Parli Pro Youth Day is scheduled for Saturday, November 16, from 9 AM to 1:45 PM at Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti. Youth training will focus on skills needed for Business Professionals of America (BPA), Health Occupation Students of America (HOSA), and SkillsUSA who participate in parliamentary competition.

The board determined how to invest one Certificate of Deposit that is maturing in November.

Board members Arrington, Edwards, and Pederson reported on the recent NAP Biennial Convention, noting the excellent presiding of NAP President Maurice S. Henderson, the value of the NAP Leadership Conference held immediately before convention, and the timely, thoughtful workshops that were offered including one given by MSAP Second Vice-President Julie Pioch.

The next meeting of the Board will be January 11, 2014 in Lansing.

DELEGATE REPORT NAP 39TH BIENNIAL CONVENTION SEPTEMBER 6-9, 2013 PORTLAND, OREGON

As with past conventions, the NAP 39th Biennial Convention was one with many memorable moments. Prior to the actual convention, a leadership conference was held, and was attended by several members. The NAP Educational Foundation held its traditional brunch and auctions, both silent and live, just prior to the opening convention. The MURP donation of a sapphire and white gold pendant necklace with a retail value of \$180 was live auctioned and was purchased for \$165, more than triple what the unit paid for it. Many thanks to Connie Deford for her wise choice of the pendant. The foundation was able to raise approximately \$6,300 from the silent and live auctions.

The opening session of the convention on Friday afternoon featured welcomes from various dignitaries and a response from our very own MSAP President Edna Arrington. The first credentials report indicated 276 voting delegates. That number would grow to 300 later that day. There were a total of 324 delegates for the convention.

As can be expected during a convention of parliamentarians, not only did every "i" need dotting and every "t" need crossing, but it needed to be done in a certain way. (That's one of the fun things about a parliamentary convention). While keypads have been used in the past NAP conventions, the keypads were different this year and required extensive explanation and demonstration.

The convention standing rules were adopted with several amendments, the program was adopted, and the convention officially got underway. Nominations for the various offices occupied a great deal of time. There were two nominees for the office of vice-president and five for the office of director-at-large (three to be elected). Those elected on Saturday morning were: President, Ann Guiberson (FL); Vice-President, Mary Randolph (WA); Secretary, Ann Rempel (KS); Treasurer, Evan Lemoine (CT); Directors-at-Large: James Stewart (CA), James Jones (IL) and Steve Glanstein (HI).

As you might imagine, lively debate occurred on almost every amendment. President Henderson presided over a most difficult time with professionalism and integrity, displaying impartiality at all times. Many comments were overheard about his calm demeanor. The delegates even managed to get all of this accomplished in the allotted amount of time—quite an accomplishment. (continued on p. 6)

To keep delegates educated and inspired, workshops were held on Saturday, Sunday, and Monday. Each delegate received a convention workshop attendance record that was stamped at the end of each workshop session. It is to be retained by the member to verify continuing education units towards recertification. Several MURP members were among the workshop presenters. Other presenters included former MURP members and two of the RONR authorship team.

The closing event of the convention was the installation banquet. Connie Deford, Past NAP President, was the installing officer. She installed the NAP officers and district directors, including our new District Four Director Joyce Brown-Watkins. Directors who will serve on the NAP Board of Directors are Denise Irminger, District Five Director, and Daniel Ivey-Soto, District Six Director.

The NAP Training Conference will be held in Oklahoma City, OK August 8-10, 2014, and the NAP 40th Biennial Convention is scheduled for Arlington, VA September 4-7, 2015 (Labor Day weekend). Plan now to attend either or both of these national events. It is an opportunity to renew friendships and to make new ones.

The convention demonstrated how well meetings can be run while allowing for differences of opinion as expressed through debate, and provides opportunity for educational workshops to enhance the knowledge of parliamentarians at all levels.
